

Did you know?

Air Quality Protection



Volusia County has reduced our air pollutant emissions by phasing in the purchase of hybrid vehicles, purchasing ethanol E-85 flex-fuel capable vehicles, purchasing hybrid-electric diesel trucks, and switching to ultra-low sulfur diesel fuel. These efforts significantly reduce harmful green house gas emissions.

At home you can . . . reduce your carbon emissions and while doing so save money at the pump by keeping your tires inflated,

Get your engine tuned up and keep your tires inflated — both help fuel efficiency. If all Americans kept their tires properly inflated (and a government study shows that many don't), gasoline use nationwide would come down 2 percent. A tune-up could boost your miles per gallon anywhere from 4 to 40 percent; a new air filter could get you 16 percent more miles per gallon.

More Air Quality tips

At home you can . . . reduce your carbon emissions and, while doing so, save money by following these tipe:

- Whether you are in line at the bank or in a fastfood drive time, foling wastes fuel and causes unnecessary emissions. Turn your engine off when you are stuck in traffic or will be lifting for some time.
- When busing your next car, pick the least politicing most efficiant vehicle that meets your needs. Nation it's an innovative hybrid that compline a gasoline engine with electric motors (and never needs to be theseed in).
- Carpboling is an economical and green way of traveling. Fewer vehicles on the road
 main fewer emissions. Consider carpboling (link to RideShare) to work with fellow
 emiscipace or planning outing with financial so only one vehicle to used. Also, public
 transportation such as worse (link to feotom-ray), reduces the surface of vehicles on
 the road and harmful emissions released into the emisconnex.
- If your destination is close, consider other transportation abstractives such as bicycling, washing, stating or any exter- namentation mode of travel. All Vittran buses are equipped with bisk rection.
